Employment, Income & Poverty, 2006: Wayne County

Labor Force

- Wayne County's labor force, including employed and unemployed workers seeking employment, totaled 52,314 in 2006.
- The county's labor force rose by 2.8% between 2000 and 2006.

Unemployment

- Wayne County's unemployment rate averaged 4.8% in 2006, compared to a statewide figure of 4.8%.
- Wayne County's unemployment rate was higher in 2006 than it was in 2000.
- Some 2,513 people were unemployed and actively seeking work in Wayne County in 2006, up from 2,043 people in 2000.

Income & Poverty

- Median household income in Wayne County equaled \$38,158 in 2006 – an amount equivalent to 89.5% of the statewide figure.
- The county's per capita income of \$18,661 was \$4,284 less than the statewide level.
- The county's poverty rate of 16.6% was higher than the statewide level of 14.7 percent.
- All together, 44.7% of the county's residents had incomes less than twice the federal poverty level (\$41,228 for a family of four).

Job Projections

- The Wayne County area is expected to lose 71,982 jobs between 2004 and 2014.
- Most of the jobs expected to add the most positions (e.g. cashiers, retail salespersons) offer low wages, few benefits and little upward mobility.
- The jobs expected to grow the most in percentage terms, like those in health fields, typically pay good wages but require workers with some type of postsecondary credential.
- Some 74% of the county's adults possessed no more than a high school degree in 2005.

Living Income Standard

- A working family with children needs to earn, on average, \$15.67/hour to cover basic living expenses in Wayne County.
