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## ECONOMIC SNAPSHOT: JOHNSTON COUNTY

*The Budget and Tax Center's Economic Snapshots provide a look at how well counties in North Carolina are faring across key indicators of economic well-being and opportunity.*

**Johnston County has a population of 193,035, which is an increase of 24.8% over the past decade.<sup>1</sup>**

### AVAILABILITY OF JOBS<sup>2</sup>

- There were 4,051 people looking for work in Johnston County compared to 1,703 job openings in December 2016.
- The county's unemployment rate was 4.4% in December 2016, compared to 4.8% in December 2015.
- There were 15,737 more employed people in the county in December 2016 than there were in December 2007 (when the Great Recession began).

### POVERTY AND ECONOMIC HARDSHIP

- 13% of county residents (23,887 people) lived in poverty and struggled to make ends meet in 2015; the state poverty rate was 16.4%.<sup>3</sup>
- 18.7% of children in the county (9,028 children) lived in poverty in 2015, compared to 23.4% statewide.<sup>4</sup>
- The poverty rate varies by race: 23% of African Americans, 31.9% of American Indians, and 41.3% of Latinos in the county lived in poverty compared to 6.4% of Asian Americans and 8.6% of whites on average from 2011 to 2015.<sup>5</sup>
- 36.3% of the county's residents were low-income on average from 2011 to 2015, meaning their incomes were less than twice the federal poverty level (\$48,500 for a family of four in 2015).<sup>6</sup>

### ABILITY TO AFFORD THE BASICS

- The county's hourly median wage of \$13.82 equaled 86.9% of the state median wage of \$15.91 in 2016. The county's median hourly wage fell by 53 cents since the recovery began in 2009.<sup>7</sup>
- For a family size of three, it costs \$25.07 per hour to make ends meet in the county, where the hourly median wage falls short of what's needed by 55.1%.<sup>8</sup>

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- Median household income in the county was \$52,681, which equaled 110% of the statewide household income of \$47,884 in 2015.<sup>9</sup>
- The richest 5% of the county's households had an average income that was 17 times greater than that of the poorest fifth of households and 4 times greater than that of the middle fifth of households, on average, from 2011 to 2015.<sup>10</sup>

### **ACCESS TO AFFORDABLE HOUSING**

- 53.3% of renters in this county spent 30% or more of their income on rent—meaning their rent was unaffordable—on average from 2011-2015.<sup>11</sup>
- Rent and utilities for a safe, modest two-bedroom unit at the county's fair market monthly rent was \$947 in 2016.<sup>12</sup>
- The two-bedroom housing wage in the county was \$18.21 in 2016, which far exceeds the state's minimum wage of \$7.25 per hour. This means that a person earning the minimum wage would have to work 100 hours per week to afford a modest two-bedroom unit at fair market rent.<sup>13</sup>

### **HEALTHY LIVES AND COMMUNITIES**

- 15% of the county's residents did not have health insurance, compared to 15.5% of all North Carolinians on average from 2011 to 2015.<sup>14</sup>
- The life expectancy rate for an African-American child born in the county is 78.1 years whereas the rate is 78.3 for a white child. The average life expectancy for all children born in this county was 78.1 years on average from 2013 to 2015.<sup>15</sup>
- There was 1 mental health provider for every 1,238 residents in the county in 2016.<sup>16</sup>

### **EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENT**

- The graduation rate for this county was 90.1% compared to the state rate of 85.6% in 2015-16.<sup>17</sup>
- The graduation rate for African Americans in this county was 85.6% compared to 84.7% for Hispanics and 92.6% for whites in 2015-16.<sup>18</sup>
- 20.3% of adults in this county had a Bachelor's degree or higher compared to 28.4% statewide on average from 2011 to 2015.<sup>19</sup>
- 22.1% of women in this county had a Bachelor's degree or higher compared to 18.3% of men on average from 2011 to 2015. Of those with this level of educational attainment, the median earnings for women was \$39,907 compared to \$61,687 for men.<sup>20</sup>

### **WORK AND INCOME SUPPORTS TO AVOID POVERTY**

- 27,547 of the county's residents received assistance from the food and nutrition services (or food stamps) program in December 2016, with 14.6% of residents receiving assistance.<sup>21</sup>

- 39,095 people in the county were eligible for Medicaid in December 2016, an increase of 70.1% since December 2007 when the recession began. Estimates suggest that 9,490 North Carolinians in the county would benefit from Medicaid expansion, delivering \$188.6 million in economic benefits to the county.<sup>22</sup>
- In 2013, 14,583 tax filers in the county claimed the state Earned Income Tax Credit, which lawmakers allowed to expire that year. The tax credit went to people that worked but earned low wages, and the benefits totaled \$1,640,006 in the county. These were dollars that helped workers make ends meet by allowing them to keep more of what they earned to support their children.<sup>23</sup>
