# **ECONOMIC SNAPSHOT: SCOTLAND COUNTY**

The Budget and Tax Center's Economic Snapshots provide a look at how well counties in North Carolina are faring across key indicators of economic well-being and opportunity.

Scotland County is a Tier 1 County and has a population of 35,806.<sup>1</sup>

### UNEMPLOYMENT<sup>2</sup>

- Scotland County's unemployment rate was 11.0% in January 2015, down from 13.0% in January 2014.
- There are (2,356) less employed persons in Scotland County today than there were in 2007.
- 11,735 workers were a part of the county's labor force in January 2015. This is a -6.4% change since January 2014.

#### **POVERTY**

- 34.1% of the county's residents (11,447 people) lived in poverty in 2013; the state poverty rate was 18%.<sup>3</sup>
- 56.6% of the county's residents were low-income on average from 2011 to 2013, meaning their incomes were less than twice the federal poverty level (\$46,100 for a family of four in 2013).<sup>4</sup>

## **WAGES & INCOME**

- The county's hourly median wage of \$13.93 equaled 89.1% of the statewide median wage of \$15.63 in 2015 and 94.8% of the living income standard for that county. The median hourly wage changed by 5.2% since the recovery began in 2009.<sup>5</sup>
- Median household income in the county was \$32,314, which equaled 70.3% of the statewide household income of \$45,195.<sup>6</sup>
- The richest 5% of the county's households had an average income that was 26 times greater than that of the poorest fifth of households and 5 times greater than that of the middle fifth of households.<sup>7</sup>

# HOUSING8

- 72.0% of renters in this county were unable to afford the fair market rent for a 2 bedroom housing unit.
- The minimum wage falls far short of what's needed to afford the fair market rent for a 2-bedroom housing unit in this county—the housing wage needed is 170.3% of the minimum wage.

### **HEALTH**

- 17.6% of the county's residents did not have health insurance, compared to 16.6% of all North Carolinians on average from 2011 to 2013.<sup>9</sup>
- The life expectancy rate for an African-American child born in the county is 73.5 whereas the rate is 76.9 for a white child. The average life expectancy for all children born in this county is 74.7.<sup>10</sup>
- There are 8.2 primary care physicians per 10,000 people in Scotland County compared to 7.6 primary care physicians per 10,000 people on average in North Carolina.<sup>11</sup>

### **EDUCATION**

- The 4-year cohort graduation rate in the 2013-2014 school year for this county was 78.3% compared to the state rate of 83.9%. 12
- The 4-year cohort graduation rate in 2013-2014 for African-Americans in this county was 77.3% compared to 0.0% for Hispanics and 80.4% for whites. 13
- 2.9% of adults in this county had a Bachelor's degree or higher on average from 2009 to 2013.<sup>14</sup>

### SUPPORTS FOR WORKING FAMILIES

- 8,530 of the county's residents received assistance from the food and nutrition (or food stamp) program in December 2007 when the Great Recession began. By December 2013, the number increased by 34.5% to 11,469 and the share of residents receiving assistance reached 32.0%.<sup>15</sup>
- In 2013, 4,951 tax filers in the county claimed the state Earned Income Tax Credit, which expired that year and was a tax credit that goes to people that work but earn low wages. The benefits totaled \$632,360—these were dollars that supported local businesses and helped workers make ends meet, allowing them to keep more of what they earned and support their children.<sup>16</sup>
- 11,560 people in the county were eligible for Medicaid in December 2014, an increase of 15.2% since December 2007.<sup>17</sup> Estimates suggest that 1,309 North Carolinians in Scotland County would benefit from Medicaid Expansion, delivering \$39.7 million in economic benefits to the county.<sup>18</sup>
