The coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic affects North Carolina's ability to adequately protect ourselves, our communities, and healthcare systems.

Our state has over 1 million residents who are uninsured and this figure is rising everyday with record numbers of people losing their jobs.¹

BENEFITS OF EXPANDING MEDICAID FOR NC



More than **500,000** North Carolinians would gain coverage, allowing them to access treatment for COVID-19 complications and address any underlying health issues that have gone untreated.²



Many people who are uninsured are working in our state's essential businesses. They are our cashiers, gas station attendants, and childcare workers⁵ They are at a high risk for infection and we need our essential workers to be safe and healthy.



The Economic Policy Institute estimated that during the last two weeks of March, over 105,000 North Carolinians lost their employer-sponsored health insurance due to job loss.¹



Ninety percent of Medicaid expansion is paid for by the federal government and the remaining 10 percent is paid by healthcare entities.⁶



Hospitals and community health centers need to get reimbursed for providing care so they can continue to keep their doors open during a pandemic.³



Complications from COVID-19 will require people who are incarcerated to access care in a hospital, risking unexpected cost overruns to state and local budgets for health services. Expanding Medicaid can provide local and state budgets a way to be reimbursed for any care incurred at a hospital for people who are incarcerated.⁷



It protects all of North Carolina when we have more people who are insured and able to access care and treatment.⁴
