

Pregnant Women

If you are a non-citizen who is currently pregnant, or thinking about becoming pregnant, here's what you need to know about upcoming Medicaid changes:

- Certain groups of lawfully present non-citizens such as refugees, asylees, and trafficking survivors will lose access to Medicaid in 2026.
- However, it's important to know that **lawfully present pregnant women will continue to be eligible for Medicaid** after October 1, 2026, in a *wide variety of immigration statuses*.
- Essentially, all pregnant women who are lawfully present, *in any form of immigration status*, are eligible for Medicaid except DACA holders. Pregnant women must meet other criteria for Medicaid eligibility, such as income.
 - Medicaid coverage for pregnant women lasts up to 12 months post-partum.
 - Medicaid coverage for pregnant women who are non-citizens has no waiting period – they can be eligible immediately if pregnant.

IMPORTANT:
Non-citizens who are pregnant women and children under 19 will continue to be eligible for Medicaid after October 1, 2026, even if they do not yet have their green cards.

- Pregnant women who are eligible for Medicaid include: green card holders, refugees, asylees, asylum applicants, victims of domestic violence, work visa holders, student visa holders, those with Temporary Protected Status, victims of human trafficking, and many more. - Pregnant and breastfeeding women in *any* immigration status, or with *no immigration status at all*, can be eligible for:
 - Emergency Medicaid to cover labor and delivery, as well as post-partum hospital care
 - Women, Infant, and Children's Supplemental nutrition program (WIC)
